

Most holy Theotokos, St Anne, all the Saints of Worcestershire, all the Saints of Britain, and all the Saints, pray to God for us!



Welcome to the season of bright sorrow! Why do we call it this?

We fast regularly all through the year, but this is the longest fasting period. The Lenten fast, however, must never become a source of pride on the one hand, or something oppressive on the other. It is a measuring stick for our individual practice. If we keep it faithfully, we must say: "We are unprofitable servants: we have done that which was our duty to do" (Luke 17:10). If we fall short of the standard for any reason, we must reproach ourselves and try to do better. Fasting is primarily about obedience, and thus humility. But it also creates a sense of need and sobriety. It teaches us to seek our consolation in things of the spirit rather than of the flesh.

For fasting, even undertaken in the right spirit of humility, is merely a physical accompaniment to the real heart and joy of Lent: the prayer and worship that are intensified during this season. The centuries-old texts of the Triodion, full of poetry, meditation, and profound truth, are among the greatest treasures of the Orthodox church. It is here that we encounter what Fr Alexander Schmemann has called the "atmosphere", the "state of mind, soul, and spirit" which is to permeate our lives and which he calls "bright sadness" - a poetic translation of the "joy-making mourning" recommended by Saint John Climacus in his Ladder of Divine Ascent. Saint John Chrysostom says:

Dost thou fast? Give me proof of it by thy works! Is it said, by what kind of works?

If thou seest a poor man, take pity on him!

If thou seest an enemy, be reconciled to him!

If thou seest a friend gaining honour, envy him not!

If thou seest a handsome woman, pass her by!

For let not the mouth only fast, but also the eye, and the ear, and the feet, and the hands, and all the members of our bodies.

Let the hands fast, by being pure from rapine and avarice.

Let the feet fast, by ceasing from running to the unlawful spectacles.

Let the eyes fast, being taught never to fix themselves rudely upon handsome countenances, or to busy themselves with strange beauties.



Jesus' calls us to forgive one another as God forgives us.

On Forgiveness Sunday, the last Sunday before Great Lent, we ask one another's forgiveness:

1st person: Forgive me! (Prostration) 2nd Person: As God forgives, I forgive. (Prostration) Forgive me.

Orthodox Prayer for Enemies

Lord Jesus Christ, Who commanded us to love our enemies, and those who defame and injure us, and to pray for them and forgive them; Who Yourself prayed for Your enemies who crucified You: Grant us, we pray, the spirit of Christian reconciliation and meekness, that we may heartily forgive every injury and be reconciled with our enemies. Grant us to overcome the malevolence and offences of people with Christian meekness and true love of our neighbour. We further entreat You, O Lord, to grant to our enemies true peace and forgiveness of sins; do not allow them to leave this life without true faith and sincere conversion. And help us repay evil with goodness, and to remain safe from the temptations of the devil and from all the perils which threaten us, in the form of visible and invisible enemies. Amen.



Lazarus Saturday

On the Saturday before Holy Week, we commemorate a major feast, the miracle of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ when he raised Lazarus from the dead after he had lain in the grave four days. The Church bears witness to the power of Christ over death.

Lazarus Breads

Ingredients:

- 4 ½ tsp. dry yeast
- 12-14 cups flour
- 1 ¹/₂ cups sugar
- 3 tsp. salt
- 2 ¹/₂ 3 cups lukewarm water
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 3/4 cup icing sugar

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. Dissolve yeast in $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of the 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ 3 cups lukewarm water.
- 3. Add sugar and salt and stir well.
- 4. Add remaining water, oil, cinnamon, 6 cups flour & stir the mixture until creamy.
- 5. Slowly add enough of remaining flour to make a medium dough.
- 6. Divide dough into however many Lazarakia you'd like and roll into logs. Cut slits for arms and legs. Cross arms across chest and pinch a head. Put cloves for eyes.
- 7. Place on slightly greased cookie sheets, cover with towel and let rise for about an hour or until almost doubled in size.
- 8. Bake loaves for 20-30 minutes or until hollow when tapped on bottom.
- 9. While baking boil aniseed and 1 cup water. Glaze with this and icing sugar while still wet.

Epistle: Acts 1:1-8 Gospel: John 1:1-17

HOW TO PARTICIPATE:

Show compassion on the poor and distressed. Trust in God, not yourself and ask for His help before every task this week.

Schedule a Confession. Every morning say, "Today I will be humble." Use up/freeze meats this week.

Pray facing East this week. Christ is returning from the East and we wait for Him! Use up/freeze dairy this week.

> Ask each other for forgiveness each evening this week before bed.

> > Bring an icon to church for a procession.

Bring a prayer rope to be blessed today! Use it and pray the Jesus Prayer each day this week.

Wear your cross to church and kiss the cross each morning with a bow!

Every time you climb stairs this week ask St. John to help you reach Paradise with the sign of the cross!

> Ask the Theotokos to offer you and the world pure thoughts and ideas this week.

> > Place your palm branches and pussywillows behind an icon at home and in your carl

Refrain from TV, Internet & Phones to honor Christ's Death.

Greet everyone with "CHRIST IS RISEN!" & say it before good morning and goodnight!

By so doing, you taught us to disregard the flesh, for it passes away; but to care for the soul, since it is immortal. Therefore, O Venerable Mary, your spirit rejoices with the Angels.

Kontakion — Tone 3

Having been a sinful woman, you became a Bride of Christ through repentance. Having attained the angelic life, you defeated demons by the weapon of the Cross; therefore, O most glorious Mary you are a Bride of the Kingdom.

4. What does that suggest about what they thought a leader is and does?


